This does pose a question for us though – how to offer the religious frame we have found so vital in our lives to a secular age where the ascendency of notions such as autonomy of choice and diversity of truth hobble anyone's pursuit of a sacred life.

This Centennial year is a fine time to celebrate, but also to rise to the challenge of offering Jesus to a world that has lost its sense of what it might be missing or where to find meaning. That may sound bold and brassy, but why not? What an exciting time to be alive!

September Worship Notes

Come Labor On Worship and Meaning in our Centennial Year

O God, you have bound us together in this life. Give us grace to understand how our lives depend on the courage, the industry, the honesty, and the integrity of all who labor. May we be mindful of their needs, grateful for their faithfulness, and faithful in our responsibilities to them; Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Liturgia, the Greek from which we get our English word liturgy has been defined as "the people's sweaty work." If our recent experience of the pandemic has taught us anything it is the meaning and value of work. Whose work is essential and what work can be done from home? But in the world of faith, we must ask; can anything truly be accomplished virtually? That is an essential question in our Centennial year! What are the consequences of remaining apart? We each have work to do. Some work can be done alone and in isolation, while other work is the work of the people congregated.

All sorts of labor will be celebrated in our September worship services. With bread and chalice, paper and pen, crayons, saw and hammer, laptop and bookbag, we will give glory to God for our mission and ministries.

In our Wesleyan tradition, when we gather for worship, we do not seek to separate ourselves from the world and go to another realm. We are not in the habit of using incense or bells to signify the presence of the transcendent moment. Rather, we seek to revive again our sense of the holy in our lives and work. God is present in our workplaces no matter what we do.

Continuing Through Mark

The Gospel According to Mark is nearly universally held to be the earliest of the Gospels and also the source for most of what is contained in the others. It is the shortest – dressing out to a petite 16 chapters. It also comes across as the most literarily economic and urgent – though this can sometimes be deceiving; many a memorable phrase comes from Mark's chapters:

"What God has joined together, let no one put asunder."

"For it is from within, out of a person's heart, that evil thoughts come."

"No one can enter a strong man's house without first tying him up."

"Nothing outside a person can defile them by going into them. Rather, it is what comes out of a person that defiles them."

A prophet is not without honor except in his own town, among his relatives and in his own home."

The month begins with Mark 7:24-37, and full it is of healing stories as Jesus meets the foreigner (Syrophoenician woman) and the occasion for an expanded perspective on Jesus' mission field. After giving a deaf and speech-impaired man full faculties, the crowd around return thanks be not listening to Jesus and telling others what Jesus asked them specifically not to say. An interesting question for us to

ponder – what do we do rejoicing in God's gifts that might be unpleasing to God? The passage from Mark 8:27-38, asks us first who we believe Jesus to be and eventually comes full circle by asking us who we think we are.

The lections we will be hearing through the end of September, as we walk through the back third of the 9th chapter (which is a marvelously extreme work in and of itself), begin with the Transfiguration on the dazzling mountain top and close with the utterly common salt of the earth.

September promises to be a great month for scripture hearing at Drexel Hill United Methodist Church! O God, you have bound us together in this life.

Project Restoration Help Needed


Our congregation has been asked to supply 2-4 volunteers - we are finishing a small amount of glue down resilient flooring, stucco repair, and minor interior painting at










New Directions for DHUMC by Keith Chase

A Short History of Martha's Vineyard Camp Meeting

This summer I visited the Martha's Vineyard Camp Meeting Association's location in Oak Bluffs on the island. It is now a national historic landmark. The idea of camp meetings originated in England and Scotland. It was part of the Great Awakening of the early 19th century. Francis Asbury was the first Methodist bishop ordained in America. Under his leadership, camp meetings became all the rage. People got together to sing, pray, receive communion and listen to circuit riders preach the gospel.

A Revival style meeting was started in Edgartown in 1835. 200 people attended the first meeting. At this time many attendees lived in tents during their visits.


The Seaview hotel was built in 1872 and it became the heart of the camp revival. In 1873 Trinity Methodist Church was built next door to the tabernacle. The meeting grounds became more permanent. Over time many people extended their stay before and after the camp meeting. Boarding houses and restaurants sprang up on the outskirts of the campgrounds and wooden cottages with elaborate jigsawcut gingerbread trim began to replace the tents.

In 1886, the resort named Cottage City became independent of Edgartown. In 1907 they changed the name to Oak Bluffs. Meetings are still held on Martha's Vineyard lasting four days, starting on Friday afternoons.

I was interested in seeing the camp meeting which is part of our Methodist history. The Tabernacle is open on the sides. You can still feel the life in this aged, but still used religious center.

Gingerbread houses surround the area. Some of these houses can be rented. You can make an appointment to visit one. Unfortunately, our tour didn't allow much time for exploration. Sunday services are held in July and August and are now interdenominational. I thought this adventure was worth sharing with our congregation.
