To Begin, Silence

Pastor's Message

Rest in the Lord, and wait patiently for him: fret not thyself because of him who prospereth in his way, because of the man who bringeth wicked devices to pass.

Psalm 37:7, King James Bible

Is there anywhere quiet anymore? Quiet is not so easily found today when we are distracted by anxious news bulletins, the ring of cell phones, or the ping of text messages coming in. We are rent by urgent advertising and pummeled with worldly matters . . . rarely can we hear music above noise, let alone the sound of silence.

Silence has been generally revered as the authentic medium of prayer - but you'd never guess this beholding some of our more spectacular religious practitioners. Even so, the ability to listen to God in quiet remains a common biblical theme.

As the Psalmist says, "Be still before the Lord and wait patiently for Him".

'What do you say to God when you pray?' Mother Theresa of Calcutta was once asked. 'I don't say anything', she replied, 'I just listen.' 'And when you listen, what does God say?' The questioner then probed. 'He doesn't say anything,' she replied, 'He just listens.'

No doubt silence is alien in a culture of pithy slogans, elevator pitches, and social media memes, but silence offers a way to ponder and listen for the divine - the unsayable and inexplicable – the musings of the mind that defy being parceled into words.

I lived in Swarthmore long enough to experience the Quaker tradition of silently waiting for the Lord. In a cave on a ledge, Elijah discovered God was not to be found in the fire, nor the whirlwind, and neither in the earthquake, but in a still small voice. In our constant din of a world it requires will to listen for such a voice. And yet, there are those who prefer silence believing in the God who speaks, albeit quietly.

Thomas Merton offered that the only words required of a priest were those of the Mass since some things are so mysterious that one must be silent to understand them. Power does not compel silence, I believe would be Merton's point, but the inadequacy of any attempt at communication suggests silence is better than our verbal efforts. As the famous 20th century philosopher, Ludwig Wittgenstein said, 'Whereof one cannot speak, thereof one must remain silent.'

Our world is far from quiet and when gifts come the purveyors are wont to present them to us with fanfare. Thus is the world we have made. And yet, as the old hymn lyric reminds us about blessings come from the transcendent, "How silently, how silently, the wondrous gift is given; so God imparts to human hearts the blessings of his heaven.

In the midst of our hubbub, my God grant you silence.


If you've got an appetite for the Word of God and a good breakfast, come on out to the Perkins Restaurant, 706 N.

September Worship Notes



AS we leave summer and enter into the program year, please remember our return to 10 AM worship beginning on September 11th. Other aspects of worship remain the same, including our continuing trek through the Gospel According to Luke. September gives us one lesson from chapter 14, two from chapter 15, and one from chapter 16 to close out the month.

On **September 4**, the Lord's Supper will be celebrated and this day will also be our last preservice hymn-sing for the summer. The message of the Lord to Jeremiah at the potter's house sets out the alternatives for Israel; obedience and salvation or disobedience and judgment. In the cluster of Jesus' sayings collected by Luke in Gospel for the day, the cost of discipleship and the need to calculate that cost thoughtfully are addressed.

September 11, will be Rally Day and we will return to 10 AM worship – with a special fellowship time planned following the service. Our first lesson for the day brings sobering words of judgment from Jeremiah, with its vivid depiction of the devastation, chaos, and gloom that result from invading armies. In our second reading, from 1 Timothy, the first of a cycle of semicontinuous readings from First and Second Timothy over the next six weeks, we hear Paul reminiscing about the mistakes of his past and his experience of divine mercy. The Lucan parables of the lost sheep and the lost coin—both emphasizing the rejoicing that occurs when sinners repent—serves as the day's Gospel.

September 18, we hear the mournful cries of Jeremiah as he grieves over the people of Israel. Universal concern sets the framework for the summons to prayer found in I Timothy, which urges us to pray for everyone, especially political leaders. The shrewd businessman whom the tradition has labeled the "dishonest steward" is the focal character in the Gospel reading, a story reflecting Luke's distinctive interest in the responsible use of possessions.

September 25, during the service we will rededicate the Black Chapel to be prayer space. Jeremiah's purchase of a field at Anathoth becomes a symbol of hope for Israel. The lesson concludes with God's assurance that "houses and fields and vineyards shall again be bought in this land." After a few weeks in the same epistle, the final reading from 1 Timothy, urges us to set our hopes on God rather than the evanescent uncertainty of riches. Contrasting images of wealthy self-indulgence and abject need are played out in the day's Gospel, the Lucan story of the rich man (which tradition names Dives) and Lazarus, which has resonances with several of the other lessons for the day.

Drexel Hill United Methodist Church was involved in many ministries in 1971. Under the heading of "Witnessing to the World Community" in the annual church report were familiar ministries such as giving to the Eastern Pennsylvania UMC Benevolence and Church School collections for the United Nations Children's Fund. Other witnesses were sending food and crafts to missionaries in India, sending coloring books to Henderson Settlement (a UMC

ministry in Central Appalachia; the Senior High Youth spent a week there subsequently), a Youth Fellowship walk-a-thon to raise money for Vietnamese children being injured during the war, and youth participation in a peace convocation at the United Nations in New York.

Heeding God's Call to End Gun Violence



Get more deeply involved. We have an on-line opportunity to join in learning how we can become advocates for gun violence reduction. A Workshop lead by Bryan Miller of Heeding God's Call to End Gun Violence is taking place on **September 27th**. There is no fee to participate.

Bryan Miller is no stranger to our Drexel Hill congregation. He preached from our pulpit the first time we sponsored the tee-shirt display to Delaware County's gun victims. Come and ask questions, be part of the community, learn more about the issues, and find your voice to act.

Currently, there is an unfortunate absence of faith communities involved in the movement to end gun violence. The purpose of the workshop is to encourage us to take leading roles. It will educate us, in brief overview, about the problem of gun violence as it affects neighborhoods, towns, and cities. The workshop will discuss means to energize and mobilize people and institutions of faith to take leadership roles in pursuit of changes in culture and law about guns. We will learn about programs and activities intended to appeal specifically to people and institutions of faith.

Bryan Miller is Executive Director of Heeding God's Call to End Gun Violence (Heeding), the PA statewide, faith-based, and grassroots movement. He left a career in international business after his brother was killed in a 1994 massacre by a lone gunman wielding a concealed assault pistol. Bryan successfully led Ceasefire NJ, for fifteen years, which was marked by major changes in gun culture and law and the achievement of one of the lowest State per capita rates of gun death in the country. He co-founded Heeding in 2009, whose faithful public pressure forced federal authorities to shutter Colosimo's; Philadelphia's most notorious gun shop. Heeding uses various activities to mobilize people of all faiths to pursue ending gun violence.

In response to the nation's gun violence crisis, a small group of DHUMC congregants began meeting after service early this summer. The group is addressing what our response to this gripping problem should be. This article summarizes some of the actions going forward and encourages everyone's involvement.

Prayer is the first priority and efforts are underway to return the prayer chapel to its intended use. This provides a real and symbolic reminder of the need to pray about gun violence and our response. God is faithful and will lead us in this and all areas as we depend in Him. The prayer chapel will be dedicated on Sunday **September 25th** with further improvements made to it between now and then.



There is also the ongoing need to better connect with the community. A community music night is planned for Friday **September 30th** from 6 to 7:30 in the parking lot. This is intended to be a simple opportunity to build relationships with the community. We hope you can attend. Other areas of attention include:

☐ Developing a church response statement to gun violence
☐ Engaging with public officials to express our views and concerns
☐ Outreach to the schools

Please pray and join in terms of our working at a grass roots level to help and heal our community and those that are isolated and hurting. We also look to partner with other organizations in addressing the problem. There is room for everyone to play a part. Please consider how you may help.
