## I Walk the Line

### Pastor's Message

1 Happy are those
who do not follow the advice of
the wicked
or take the path that sinners tread
or sit in the seat of scoffers,
2 but their delight is in the law of
the Lord,
and on his law they meditate
day and night.
Psalm 1:1-2 NRSV

I am interested in the stories behind hymns, ballads, and songs. Johnny Cash, who was born on February 26, 1932, had a childhood of hardship in rural Arkansas. This upbringing, as well as his battles with drug and alcohol addiction, were later the subject of many of his ballads. Cash became known as, "The Man in Black," and sang of some of the deepest pain of human existence until his death in 2003.

Cash was quite public about his Christian faith, but also open regarding his struggles with faith. A prominent illustration of this is the words of his hit song *I Walk the Line*. He said it was written to affirm his desire to remain, "true to those who believed in him and depended on him, true to himself, and true to God." You might enjoy, by the way,

reading the lyrics to *I Walked the Line* next to Psalm 1. No doubt, Cash had Psalm 1 dancing in his spirit as he wrote.

To be sure, commitment is an important attribute; it is essential in public and private life. Friendships wilt and falter without loyalty. Business dealings fall apart without the firm assurance that a promise made is a promise kept. Yet, while we sometimes fail in our commitment to God or to others, Christian faith claims that God is always faithful.


The story of the Prodigal, told by Jesus, is one of the greatest in our culture. It tells of a son who asks his father for his share of the inheritance and then leaves and travels to a far country. He squanders his money and eventually, penniless he returns home to throw himself to his father's mercy. What he finds, however, is that his Father has been waiting to forgive him and to welcome him home. Over the years, people have sometimes focused on the attitude of the prodigal son,

or of the older brother who in the story is angry with his father for forgiving his wayward brother – who he rightly sees as a stupid fool. Yet, I am always drawn to think of the waiting, father. Whether 'we walk the line' or not, the Bible says God is like a loving parent who is always waiting for us.

We give you thanks for your love, O God, which never waivers. We pray you keep us ever faithful to you and in our relationships with others.

# **February Worship Notes Another Season in Faith**



On Sunday, February 2nd, we continue reading the account of the early events in Jesus' ministry. In fact, all the Gospel lessons during February are from Luke, which is the larger pattern of Year C in the cycle of lections. Luke 4:21—30 contains the famous words, "Truly I tell you, no prophet is accepted in his hometown." This is also the place where Jesus' own townsfolk seek to throw him over a cliff.

Jeremiah's report of his vocation (Jeremiah 1:4—10) is good preparation for the Lucan emphasis upon the parallels between the role of Jesus and that of the earlier Hebrew prophets: gracious words came out of his mouth, and no prophet is honored in his own country. The passage from

Jeremiah records his call and commission. "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, and before you were born I consecrated you; I appointed you a prophet to the nations." It also supports the theme of conflict with opponents in the Gospel lection.

The much-loved words of Paul regarding love (1 Corinthians 13: 1—13) are included in this week's service.

More is heard, on February 9th, from the semicontinuous readings from the Gospel of Luke and 1 Corinthians. This morning, we have an example of the lections not always presenting a single or even dominant theme for the worshipper. However, a motif present in one way or another in both Gospel and Epistle is concern with the power and authority of the word. First Corinthians 15: 1—11 is Paul's summary of the Gospel that he had preached and through which God works. In Luke 5: 1—11 the people crowded to hear from Jesus' "the word of God", he taught them from the boat, and at the "word" of Jesus Simon let down the nets again. Moreover, the Gospel account of the call and response of the apostles parallels in significant ways the vocation of Isaiah and his response.

The readings from Luke and 1 Corinthians continue on February 16th, each raising different issues. Luke 6:17—26 begins the Sermon on the Plain (Luke's sermon on the Mount takes place closer to sealevel) with a series of blessings and woes, in part parallel to the Beatitudes (Matt. 5:3ff). Luke stresses the contrast between the righteous and the unrighteous, between weal and woe.

First Corinthians 15: 12—20 turns our attention to Paul's argument concerning belief in the resurrection. It does to some extent suggest some of the eschatological tone of the Gospel reading.

To close the Sundays this month, on February 23rd, Genesis 45:3—11, 15 is included, doubtless selected to be read because it reinforces the main concerns our Gospel from Luke 6:27—38, in which Jesus teaches that one should love one's enemies. Joseph, in his forgiveness of his brothers, becomes an example of such love, of lending without thought of return. God's providential care. Paul's faith in the resurrection expressed in 1 Corinthians 15:35—38, 42—50. Here we'll hear Paul answer his own question, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?"

At Drexel Hill UMC we have been holding the Souper Bowl of Caring since 2003, collecting thousands of pounds of items for donations and over \$2000.

**WHAT YOU CAN DO:** This year, once again, Congregation members are encouraged to bring items to donate to the Upper Darby Food Center. They are in need of creamy peanut butter, jelly, spaghetti sauce, spaghetti, canned fruits, cans of Chef Boyardee

products, cans of chili, white potatoes and other canned, non-perishable items. (check "use by" dates!)


# **Undies for Epiphany**
