Ancestry Pastor's Message

Once you were not a people, but now you are the people of God. Once you had not found mercy, but now you have. 1 Peter 2:10 Weymouth New Testament

Five years ago, I spent my free time during the summer digging through census records. I have seen the census documents that describe my great-great grandmother's and father's household in 1871. They lived in a small house close to the river in my family's hometown. The document reports how old everyone in the house is and what occupations they hold. Governments engage in census taking in order to understand what they are governing, to assure that they are taxing everything the way they wish to tax it, and to map trends to help plan for the future. But for me, and for lots of people, it's past census results that are interesting as a way of researching our family histories.

As a pastor, I sometimes get caught up in someone else's genealogy projects. Drexel Hill United Methodist Church keeps registers of Baptisms, Confirmations, marriages, and deaths and so from time to time I get requests to search our books from someone wanting to trace their family tree. This usually brings up rather basic information such as names and dates, but occasionally someone learns something new, for instance, that their grandfather was born in Chester, not Philadelphia, and transferred his membership from a Presbyterian Church and so was not a life-long Methodist.

In the Christian scriptures lineage and family trees are central to the story of salvation. Two Gospels (Luke at 3:23–38 and Matthew at 1:1–17) begin their account of the life of Jesus with a family lineage, a genealogy. Jesus is the Son of God, they proclaim, but also a child in a human family whose roots can be traced back to Abraham, and further back even to the beginning of time!

When a baby comes along, parents, siblings, and aunts and uncles often look for family traits. They claim to see her father's nose, his grandmother's eyes. But they look also to the future, for hope and possibility. Look at those long fingers - she'll be a pianist; such strong legs - he'll run the bases for the Phillies. The past is part of who we are, and being open to what we might one day become is also. Inheritance is not a static thing, but what we make of our lives to pass on to others.

I believe there is little to nothing that separates the realities of a family from those of a congregation in this respect. Jesus Christ, came to weave the life of heaven into our human story, our family story, and our congregation's story. Perhaps all that is required of us is to live as those who are made God's children through adoption by grace, and to reflect the image of God's love throughout our lives. There might be more, but I doubt it.

To my dear congregation of Drexel Hill United Methodist Church, I pray you will always delight in having been woven into the life of heaven and reflect the image of God's love throughout your lives.

Ascension – I Am with You Always



Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world. Amen. Matthew 28:20 King James Bible

The Ascension, celebrated 40 days after Easter, is one of the chief feasts of the Christian year. Depending on where you grew up and what congregation you belonged to, this holiday might or might not mean much to you. Nevertheless, Ascension dates back at least to the later 4th century. Any old preacher worth her salt will tell you that the vital factor in the Ascension account is not Jesus departing into heaven (dramatic though that might seem), but Jesus' assurance that he will be with us always. Sorting out how to celebrate this spiritual truth is worth mulling over at least, and may be worth some serious struggle. Forty days following any Sunday will land you on a Thursday, but in our brand of Christianity we have shifted the celebration to the nearest convenient Sunday. Here at Drexel Hill UMC, we'll be celebrating the Ascension on May 21st.

We don't really need a special day to understand intellectually that Christianity teaches that Jesus ascended into heaven any more than we need one to understand the Easter message or the meaning of the Declaration of Independence or that, given present social norms, not much work can be accomplished on January 1st, due to headaches. Still, the faith is not only, or primarily an intellectual exercise – faith is a way of life. What we do and when we do it will influence who we are.

Project Restoration

Drexel Hill United Methodist Church hosted our first Volunteers in Mission (VIM) group from April 23rdthrough 28th. The workers were from United Methodist congregations in Harrisburg and Bellefonte, Pennsylvania. The teams travelled to Eastern Delaware County to assist with repairing storm-damaged houses and otherwise helping families in difficult storm-related circumstances.



One of the families help live in Downingtown and had their basement and ground floor flooded during Hurricane Ida. The family came to Drexel Hill on Thursday night, April 27th, to share a meal with the work team in our Rainbow Room.



Drexel Hill United Methodist Church is part of Project Restoration, a program of our Eastern Pennsylvania Conference funded through a grant from the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR). The Project is currently planning work in Delaware County and was in need of a location to house the volunteers. Drexel Hill was able to house groups and three have already been our guests in April. Generally, the groups are using two rooms beneath the sanctuary for sleeping spaces and the kitchen to store food and prepare meals. Initially, the coordinator, Denise Shelton, is working with the local YMCA to provide shower facilities.

The week before the first team's arrival, a group of DHUMC volunteers worked through the living quarters to make them as clean and inviting as possible. The

reports from the VIM workers were that the rooms were up to the task and everyone slept well.

On Sunday, April 23rd, an impromptu group of DHUMC volunteers worked in our kitchen to bring it up to working condition. The volunteers cleaned and sorted through a lot of articles that have been left in the kitchen over the past few years. This work paid-off handsomely, as the kitchen crew from the VIM groups were able to begin their work with little trouble.

This is a splendid moment in the life of our congregation! We'll be involved in a major ministry of our Conference, a vital ministry to our community, and be able to use some of the vast and underutilized asset which is our building. Much help will be needed in the coming month to turn our facilities into an attractive home away from home for the volunteers.



DHUMC Response to Gun Violence Update



As a part of DHUMC's response to gun violence, the congregation participated in a postcard signing campaign to our recently elected PA Speaker of the House. Not only did our members sign, but friends and family members of the congregation were also invited to sign cards demonstrating their desire to end the gun violence that is so prevalent in today's society. Close to 60 people were a part of this first campaign.

DHUMC Community Connections Health and Music Fair, May 13^{th!}

The countdown has begun! We are approaching the date of our first ever Community Fair that will highlight resources for our community and provide a live, musical program throughout the day.



The Fair is scheduled from 11 am to 2 pm, and will be held in the parking lot on School Lane. Various community organizations will have tables with information, free giveaways and activities for children and adults. The guest organizations include COSA, Delco Community College, the Red Cross, Delco Library, and the Community Y (There is rumor of a pop-up Zumba session!). Heeding God's Call to End Gun Violence will be there, as will UD Tree Tenders and the Delco Department of Human Services, with handouts about supportive services for mental health concerns.

The musical part of the fair is being coordinated by DHUMC Music Director, Dan Matarazzo, and will feature both vocal and instrumental pieces, presented by the DHUMC choir, The Kelly Street Singers, Deo Volente, a men's trio, and possibly a few surprise guests!

What is happening for children? Face painting, sidewalk chalk drawing, making bookmarks, free books, plus more activities at the individual tables. Did I mention the free soft pretzels donated by Wawa?

Crafters & Fellowship Luncheon


