Hey, Hey. Anybody care? Pastor's Message

"See that you don't tell this to anyone. But go, show yourself to the priest and offer the sacrifices that Moses commanded for your cleansing, as a testimony to them". Instead, he went out and began to talk freely, spreading the news. As a result, Jesus could no longer enter a town openly but stayed outside in lonely places. Yet the people still came to him from everywhere. Mark 1:40-45

An old camp song contains these lines: "Hey, hey, anybody listening? Hey, hey, anybody care?" I imagine the healed leper in the Bible story singing such. He was not big on following instructions but he was overflowing with joy at having a new life! He had been one way, but following an encounter with Jesus, he was changed. Caring is the vital factor in Christian expression. I have been playing with an analogy lately - to the extent that a congregation is God's intensive care unit for the Spirit in the world, we need to understand the theology and dynamics of caring. Although the laity occasionally supplement and even substitute for the clergy, the laity are far beyond being the clergy's "right hand" or junior care givers.

Certainly, the clergy have a ministry of caring. It includes envisioning and expressing what a caring community looks like and modeling caregiving through the pastoral occasions provided by the life of the congregation. Also, the clergy have the task of defining, encouraging, enabling, and supporting the laity in their own, special ministries of caring.

The laity have a caring ministry arguably more important than that of the clergy. The ministry of the laity is located about 1% of the time in the church and about 99% of the time in the world. In the church, the caring of the laity is expressed through joys and concerns during the worship service, visiting the sick with news of the service, taking meals to families facing particular challenges, email, card, and letter ministries, and a variety of personal initiatives. In the world, the ministry of the laity is in homes, offices, classrooms, school boards, laboratories, traffic, shopping malls - wherever human beings make connection with human beings. That lay ministry has at least four kinds of caring that people can do for one another: praying, touching, listening, and action.

Pray for all manner and condition of life. Praying doesn't manipulate the will of God, but it heightens our awareness. Prayer opens us up to God's voice. Do not be afraid to touch someone in kindness. We must be conscious and careful as we touch in this day and age, and yet, there is no substitute for touch, and the older we get the more hugs and kisses we need. Practice the precious ministry of listening. Take time to hear what people say and what they don't say. Listening creates space for others to come in, and political listening creates space for peace and justice. Caring means listening seriously to the captains and the kings and also the meek and the lowly. Action on what we have seen and heard is the witness par excellence. What we do after we have listened is mighty important to caring whether we stand in a cloud of tear gas, visit a housebound person, or leap for joy like the leper.

"Hey. Hey. Anybody care?"

The season after Pentecost is a time for serious, focused study of Scripture. In the Common Lectionary, the Hebrew Scripture lessons, beginning with Trinity Sunday (June 4th), provide a series of twenty-three readings from the Pentateuch (the first five books of the Bible), from the creation to the death of Moses, and conclude the season with texts from the Books of Joshua and Judges that take the story through the conquest and into the period of the judges. But that takes us all the way to December! This article is just about the lessons for June. Matthew is the Gospel for continuous study this year. The advantage of suchsemicontinuous selections is that we get to hear and reflect upon single Gospelaccount in some depth. The disadvantage, of course, is that often on given Sundays the themes of the texts do not converge. Our first lesson may have nothing to do with the Gospel lesson, they just happen to be in the same worship service.



Our lessons on **Trinity Sunday**, **June 4th**, will be Genesis 1:1-2:4*a*, and Matthew 28:16-20. Trinity Sunday was introduced into the liturgical cycle of the church as the celebration of a doctrine. At worship this day, reflect upon that doctrine, but, more than that, they direct attention to the reality that called forth the doctrine in the first place. In the biblical tradition, the one God is experienced as transcendent Creator, as incarnate, and as present in and among the lives of believers. The Hebrew Scripture reading, the classic account of creation by the Priestly Writer, portrays God as the Creator of a magnificent, orderly universe. The Gospel, Matthew's concluding section, contains pronouncements in the name of the triune God.

The Second Sunday After Pentecost, June 11th, brings us the call of Abraham and his response (Genesis 12:1-9), initiating the history of salvation that will find its center in the exodus from Egypt. Our Gospel

lection (Matthew 9:9-13, 18-26) has two parts: the account of Jesus' controversy with the Pharisees because tax collectors and sinners followed him and ate with him (which, it should be noted, concludes with an explicit quotation from Hosea 6:6) and Jesus' healing of the synagogue leader's daughter.

June 18th is the Third Sunday After Pentecost, our lections for the morning are Genesis 18:1-15, 21:1-7 and Matthew 9:35-10:23; a generous portion of readings, but intriguing narrative, nevertheless. Our Hebrew Scripture reading, the promise and birth of Isaac to Abraham and Sarah, follows as a natural sequel to last week's lesson. The Gospel lection reports how Jesus taught and preached the good news of the kingdom and how he began to commission the Twelve. The additional verses highlight the cost of discipleship.

The Fourth Sunday After Pentecost, June 25th, has Genesis 21:8-21 and Matthew 10:24-39 as our lessons. The Hebrew Scripture reading relates the moving story of the rejection of Hagar and Ishmael and their eventual rescue by God. Following on last week's account of God's fulfillment of the promise to Abraham and Sarah through the birth of Isaac, today's text provides an important statement about the extension of God's gracious care beyond a single hereditary line. In Matthew 10:24–39, Jesus instructs the disciples about how they should relateto their master, reassures them by distinguishing between their seeming adversaries and their true Adversary, clarifies the nature of true and false confession, and honestly confronts them with the critical choices disciples have to make.


Crafters & Fellowship Meet Up
