Listen to Christmas

Pastor's Message

And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, 'Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors!'

Luke 2:13-14

The traditional scene is a stable next to a hotel in Bethlehem . . . and all the while, the rest of the world celebrates Christmas reading Dickens, reciting Clement Clarke Moore, or shopping Amazon. All seek the iconography of Christmas, but for the faithful disciples the stable is at the center. The son of Mary is born. Against the numerous sounds and distractions of a world that doesn't know (and if it does doesn't much care) the first cries of a baby say God's supreme intervention into this world. For disciples a moment to celebrate, and for the world. ... a story, a myth, a puzzle, perhaps.

This traditional scene, the birth of Mary's son, foretold in prophesy and song, is far from anticipated. No one knew when or how God would fulfill that ancient prophecy. Few could have entertained the idea that fulfillment would come in the form of a vulnerable baby, born

of anonymous parents turned away because 'there was no room in the inn'. Many looked for the Great leader of the nations, Commander-in-Chief of the armies of God's wrath, the ultimate political Overlord, or the religious Prophet Almighty upholding traditionalism. A baby born in poverty, however? No, that could not be.

Mary's son will live his life amidst vulnerability, injustice, weakness, and death. Because Jesus knew these things God knows us in our weakness, in our moral dilemmas, in our lack of faith. We, in turn, see the presence of God who understands our human condition. Mary's son has bridged the divide between the transcendent perfection and those who need hope, love, and compassion most; people like you and me in a world such as ours. God comes to persons financially adrift and offers an anchor. God comes to those surrounded by death in Palestine, Ukraine, and Sudan and promises peace. The Son of Mary suffers with us - suffers in the refugee camps, beside the sickbed, in the heart-broken in the experience of those who

wonder whether there is any point to going on.

Hope, love, and peace; the words Christians use at Christmas seem far removed from the experience of this world. But to those who identify the Son of Mary with weakness, the message is hope, love, and peace. No one long believes the Christian faith is easy. But in the weakness of the birth in the stable, God becomes one with us. At the Lord's Supper we say: we are one with God, one with each other, and one in ministry to all the world. The stresses of the world remain: poverty, armies marching, cruelty. Our faith is challenged. But at the stable God's love leads to the Savior who becomes one with us.



November Worship Notes Advent All Around Us



For those souls not overly distracted by the coming of Christmas, the diversity of sources from which this year's Advent lessons are drawn brings a big change from the seeming lock-step through Mark we've experienced for the last few months.

The season of Advent – the word comes from the Latin word adventus meaning "coming" or "visit" - begins four Sundays before Christmas and ends on Christmas Eve. Advent is the beginning of the liturgical year for Christians: the great cycle of telling the story of Jesus life, meaning, and ministry begins once more. In 2024, we'll be spending most of our time in the company of the Gospel According to Mark. But we'll see a lot of John and a bit of Matthew as well (after all, Mark's is the shortest Gospel, with just 16 chapters).

Although the secular world accustoms us to celebrating Christmas from the day after Halloween until Christmas Day, in both Christian tradition and on the Church calendar, the Christmas season lasts sundown on December 24 (Christmas Eve) through Epiphany of the Lord (January 6). You know about the four calling birds, the three French hens, and so forth; Christians celebrate the twelve days of Christmas.


