Showing Faith in Times of Upheaval Pastor's Message

Now it was Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James, and the other women with them who told this to the apostles. Luke 24:10 NRSV

In all four gospels, Mary Magdalene is either the first, or among the first, witnesses of the resurrection of the Lord. In Luke, she is among the women who followed Jesus from Galilee to Jerusalem. Mary is present at his crucifixion and burial. Early in the morning on the first day of the week, while it is still dark, she goes to the tomb to give Jesus the dignity of observing the decent burial customs. She is worried about the stone at the entrance of the tomb . . . but you know that familiar story. The stone is already rolled away! When she sees the empty tomb, she runs to the disciples and announces the risen Christ. They do not believe her until they see Jesus with their eyes.

I have wondered why the risen Jesus appears to Mary Magdalene first and not to the other disciples. It may be because Jesus knows that she is the one who has experienced a resurrection in her own life. Remember?

Jesus casts out seven demons from her. We don't know what they are; the Bible is silent on that score. Possibilities include her being possessed by an evil spirit, or having sinning, or having suffering from mental illness. I am of a mind that such particulars are not necessary to understand the Gospel message. All we really need to know from the Gospel is that after she was cured, she became his faithful disciple. Ancient writings in the Jesus- following community called her an apostle to apostles. From Mary's backstory, we can tell that her life was like a tomb, so-to-speak. Jesus rolled away the stone of despair from her tomb. He rolled away the stone of uncertainty, the stone of fear from the tomb of all his disciples.


We are living in changing times; significantly changing times even. The way we used to order our families, our presumptions about buying and selling, and what we expect of our neighbors have been blown-to-pieces. Through the abiding upheaval, the truth of the faith continues though – we are to love God and neighbors. That is the same job in a bewilderingly different environment. How do we manage that?

Most of us have heard the Easter story rather a few times now, but the question remains, "Do we experience the risen Jesus in our daily lives? It is easy for our lives to be sealed off in our own tombs from the evidence of resurrection and new life. It is easy to let a stone settle with a thud over openings, keeping us from enjoying the visible evidence of God's presence around us.

Our risen Christ invites us to roll them away, live a new life, and shout from the top of your lungs, "He is alive! Christ is indeed risen! Hallelujah!"

Join in worship on Maundy Thursday, 7:30pm, April 17 th . On Maundy Thursday night Christians celebrate the supper Jesus shared with his disciples before his crucifixion, when Jesus instituted the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. The gospel text for the evening, John 13:1-17, 31b – 35, only makes the briefest mention of the supper, however. Nevertheless, it is an appropriate text for the evening. The title Maundy Thursday recalls the new commandment (manatum novum in Latin) Jesus speaks in John 13:34, "Love one another.

Following the service, we will remove all the

paraments and brass in preparation for Good Friday. the ancient practice of stripping the church on this night following communion is a vivid way of showing the desolation and abandonment our Lord was subject to following his arrest.

Maundy Thursday is a service full of a special immediacy not least because the Upper Room supper took place at night – and we have few opportunities to partake of this Sacramental meal at night (Ash Wednesday evening is the only other evening Lord's Supper observance presently in our congregation's life.).

Come, eat and drink, and remember.
