# **Refuge From the Storm**

### Pastor's Message

But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you. Matthew 6:33

What difficult news we have been hearing from Puerto Rico, an island that has suffered much and for long. The poet Ann Weems wrote that the stories of the grieving are too painful for salvation to come through selfhelp. That's a cold observation in a culture that is becoming more isolated and individualistic every day. "Our only hope is to march ourselves to the throne of God and in loud lament cry out the pain that lives in our souls."

Psalms of Lament, Weems' exceptional collection of poetry, was published more than a quarter of a century ago, in the wake of her son's murder. Still, her words give voice to the unanswered pain of generations of others in the world. Grief, she said, would not be resolved "until God Himself wipes the tears from our eyes."

What stands out most about Weems' writing is her chutzpah! These days we think of chutzpah as extreme self-confidence or audacity, but in its Yiddish use has an insolent overtone. I learned long ago that its origins were actually in having the temerity to question God. Ann Weems has a brutal honesty and directness in her speech to God.

In one poem, that seems tailormade for the pandemic, she cries,

How long will you watch, O God, as we your people live huddled in death?

In another, she invokes a litany of world-wide injustices, then faults God and pleads with God,

> ... is this any way to run a world? O Merciful One, let us rest between tragedies!

There is a formula, a form and order, to lament in the scriptures: there is allowance for tears and rage, petition and redress . . . and vet, also expressions of trust and praise. To be in lament for the world, says the Old Testament scholar Walter Brueggermann is to engage in a prophetic act of political imagination. In holding fast to our belief that God will act and transform the pain, we dare to dream of God's justice.

In Luke's Gospel, Jesus says, "Ask and it will be given to you", as he praises persistence and assures us of God's generosity. Now is the moment to ask on behalf of the suffering world.



some activities like stretching in the gym, shooting basketball (no recording devices allowed). Some of you may know of other activities that fit in the realm of light aerobics.



# **October Worship Notes**

### What's in a Prayer?

Get ready for a Lord's Prayer rollercoaster in October! Each Sunday in the month we will be praying a different iteration of Christianity's most important prayer. Some will have tiny and subtle differences while others will be an unfamiliar departure.

The "Lord's Prayer", also called the "Our Father" in Roman Catholic circles, or the Pater Noster (same thing, but in Latin), is a central prayer of the Christian faith. Jesus taught his disciples the Lord's Prayer as the way to pray. So, this prayer is just about the most common aspect of Christianity – probably only outdone by the Cross as a Christian identifier.

If you grew up at Drexel Hill United Methodist Church, then you've probably been accustomed to one version of the prayer. If you arrived here from a Reformed, Anabaptist, or Anglican background, you've probably heard the Lord's Prayer phrased just a little bit differently.

Two versions of this prayer are recorded in the Gospels: a longer form within the Sermon on the Mount in the Gospel of Matthew, and a shorter form in the Luke when "one of his disciples said to him, 'Lord, teach us to pray, as John taught his disciples'". Regarding the presence of the two versions, some have suggested that both were original, the Matthean version spoken by Jesus early in his ministry in Galilee, and the Lucan version one year later, very likely in Judea.

If all of this is too much for you, take heart! We'll return to our familiar pattern in November.



Pastor Atkinson leads the rededication of the Black Prayer Chapel.




Members of the DHUMC partipate in the rededication of the Black Prayer Chapel.
